2016: San Pablo Small Biz Canvassing:2 days. 38 businesses.29 receive info. 8 complete audit.



2017: Energize Richmond Campaign4 days. 85 businesses.64% free energy audits. 58% ESL.



2012-2017: MCE has allocated \$115,000 for low-income solar rebates in partnership with GRID Alternatives

2016: MCE customers earned \$1M+ 2017: Expect MCE customers earn \$1.2M+

MCE Board reduces rates by 3.7% in April 2017. Follows 9% reduction from September 2016.

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IOUs proposing PAM to replace PCIA.

CalCCA opposes because PAM:

- Undermines CCA procurement autonomy (allows allocation of REC and RA attributes);
- Doesn't fix PCIA issues (transparency, certainty);
- Increases complexities of true stranded costs;
- Allows market manipulation to artificially inflate CCA costs;
- Eliminates incentive for IOUs to resell long-term contracts intact (more revenue than on spot market)

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2MW of new solar at Freethy Industrial Park, 26 jobs. RichmondBUILD. \$550,000 yearly revenue. 600 homes per year.

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1MW of new solar at abandoned Cooley Quarry. Novato. Local Sol. 17 jobs. GHG impact ~remove 56 cars/one year.

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10.5MW Solar One, RichmondBUILD. Q4 2017. Chevron brownfield. 341 jobs. Minimum 50% local labor. Expected 60% union labor.

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RichmondBUILD students on Solar One site MCE Workforce Dev contracts: MCCDC ~\$240,000; Rising Sun ~\$140,000; RichmondBUILD ~\$100,000

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MCE received **CEC grant of \$1.75 million** for an innovative, scalable DER pilot to broadly deploy EE, carbon-free DER, local RE integration & low-cost solutions toward our goal of 100% carbon free electricity by 2025.

Technology includes high-efficiency heatpump water heaters, LED lighting, energy storage, solar, insulation upgrades, methane gas capture/anaerobic digestion, EV charging, and more.

Project to be piloted in 300+ unit multi-family property in Richmond, the Novato Sanitation District, and a Sanitary Service company location in San Rafael.

Broken hot water heater & furnace




Broken ducts = higher heating bills



(Old) Service Delivery System



- Interventions in DeWayne's home cost 25% less (\$12k vs \$16k) 0
- DeWayne hasn't been hospitalized for an asthma related visit






